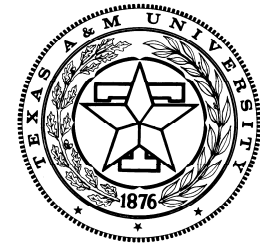

The Honors Program in the College of Liberal Arts provides an exclusive and individualized educational experience at Texas A&M University. Students in the Program are part of an intellectual community who take challenging courses from the College's best professors. Courses provide a broad exploration of the liberal arts in both the humanities and social sciences. Students may embark on an in depth research track with a faculty member of their choosing resulting in a senior Honors Thesis, or simply elect to take a broad variety of liberal arts honors courses.

Requirements of The Plan

Students accepted into the LBAR Plan choose one of the following options:

Plenary Honors

Complete 30 hours of Liberal Arts Honors coursework, with at least 15 of those hours at the 300/400 level. This option allows students to concurrently complete requirements for “University Honors” through the University-wide Honors Program and gives students the maximum flexibility in course selection.



Thesis Option

Complete 15 hours of Liberal Art Honors coursework, with at least nine hours at the 300/400 level. After coursework is completed, a two-semester research project under the direction of a faculty mentor leads to the completion of an Honors Thesis. This option allows students interested in graduate or professional school or in a deeper understanding of their major subject to undertake a meaningful research experience. Students may qualify for the University-wide Honors Research Fellows Program.

The Courses

Participants of the LBAR Plan have the flexibility to choose from honors coursework throughout the College of Liberal Arts. Many introductory courses have honors sections that will challenge students beyond the typical coursework.
